Dear George

I am writing because of the enormous public interest in coronavirus, which has resulted in more than fifty e-petitions on coronavirus being published to date, signed by over two million people. We are receiving hundreds of petitions on coronavirus on a daily basis, which show there is a lot of anxiety and concern about the support available to people affected by the outbreak, and the Government's response to the outbreak.

Following the large number of petitions on coronavirus we asked the people who had signed these petitions what questions they most wanted answers to. On Wednesday we held an evidence session with representatives from the Department for Health and Social Care, the Department for Education, and the Department for Work and Pensions, putting many of these questions to Ministers and the Deputy Chief Medical Officer.

This was an extremely useful session, but the public also suggested a number of questions which are the responsibility of other Departments, including yours. I am therefore writing to ask you to respond to the following questions, which came through most strongly from our public engagement:

How will access to food and supplies for everyone – and particularly the elderly, vulnerable, and key workers – be maintained as the outbreak develops?

What is being done to address panic buying and prevent price hikes of key items?

What is being done to increase availability for online delivery slots, to enable people to buy essential goods without having to leave their home unnecessarily?

How are foodbanks being supported to continue operating during the outbreak?

Given the constantly evolving nature of the current situation, I would be grateful if you could provide a response to the above by Friday 3 April, so we can make these available to the public as quickly as possible.

I hope we will be able to continue the dialogue as the situation progresses and particularly as the usual parliamentary mechanisms for raising these issues have become more restricted. This might involve further sessions with Ministers and officials, and asking your Department to provide updated answers to the public's latest questions at regular intervals.
